General differences between liberal and labor.

Labor traditionally came out of the union movements that realized they needed political power to start to influence conditions and wages for workers and continued to involve the role of the state in economic prosperity. Labor party members have strict party rules and policies that they can't step outside, great for being organized and running things efficiently under strict leadership but also inherently less freedom in choices.

Liberal or conservative parties have traditionally been about the promotion of private property and enterprise, the maintenance of a strong military, and the preservation of traditional cultural values and institutions. They also have more voting freedom within the party to vote more for their own electorate concerns, which can tend to make them appear disorganized but this is because there can be more inherent freedom in choices.

I can strongly recommend independent Colin Shearing, Defend Local Business for #1 above the line in upper house/ legislative council.

The reason I say this is Colin ticks all the criteria and especially for the experience and the potential creation of community and support of family and small to medium business. This is because local small/ medium businesses will facilitate local community, social and economic health. Colin's experience in retail and four decades of networks will allow great potential for change via one political member more so than any other candidate I have come across, hands down.

Family First Party (FFP) and Australian Family Party (AFP) have a strong Christian and family value base with AFP have a more liberal economic focus on free market determining working pay and conditions and FFP being more traditional in protecting worker rights.

One Nation is a good option with a strong local Australian emphasis and protecting Australian resources and culture.

So, in reality you could swap these 3 parties (FFP, AFP and One Nation) around in any order based on your own value emphasis.

In fact, I personally, may favour One Nation over FFP and AFP but they all represent a strong freedom focus such as freedom against medical coercion, Censorship, movement and lockdowns and the need for a complete rewriting of the Emergency management act so this long term public servant, bureaucratic control of our state can never happen again.
